2021 IN BRIEF

PRE-SCHOOL EDUCATION

259 Children aged 3-5 are supported to attend pre-school education. These children come from the neediest Rwandan and refugee families in urban areas of Rwanda.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

146 Refugee and Rwandan youth from the neediest families aged 19-30 without an opportunity to pursue formal education are supported for vocational trainings. Those who choose to become entrepreneurs after the training receive start-up kits to start small businesses.

PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

739 Many refugees suffered various traumas before fleeing. In addition, most of them fled leaving everything behind and had to start their lives from scratch. Refugees in urban areas receive psychological and social support.

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTERS

1684 Refugees are trained in basic computer skills. The acquired knowledge allows them to improve their performance and to be more competitive in the job market.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

296 The brightest young refugees aged 14-25 from Mahama Refugee Camp and the host community are supported. They are integrated into public boarding secondary schools.

UNIVERSITY EDUCATION

77 Young refugees who have successfully completed secondary school and have no opportunity to continue with university education are reintegrated into universities in Rwanda. The selection is made on the basis of performance in the national test organized at the end of advanced secondary school.

ECONOMIC SUPPORT

692 The neediest refugee and Rwandan households are trained in the management of income-generating activities in solidarity groups. They are then supported with microcredits or grants to earn a decent living in exile. Women and youth are prioritized.

E-LEARNING

136 Computer skills enable students to improve their performance and adults to compete in the job market through the online training centers in Kigali and Mahama.

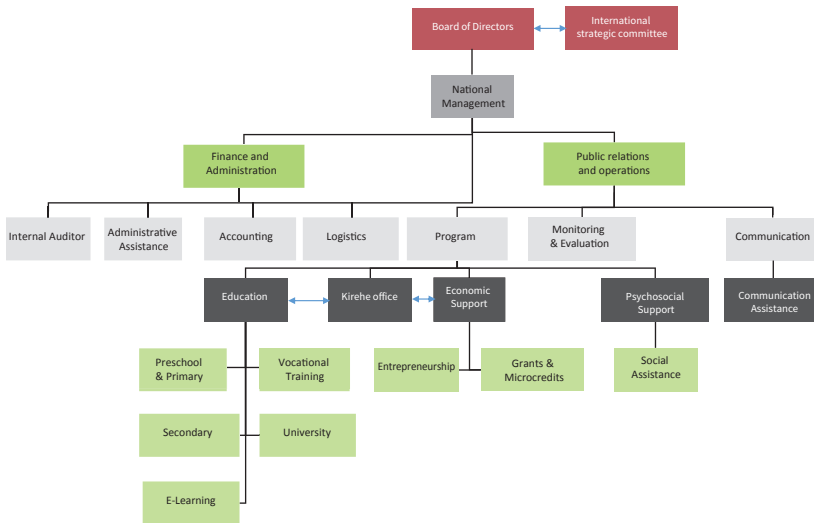

BACKGROUND

Since October 1993, Maison Shalom has been working for the protection and promotion of children's rights. In Burundi, Maison Shalom protected and raised orphans and other vulnerable children. These children were supported in their communities through education, health and community development programs. In total, Maison Shalom has supported over 50,000 children in Burundi and the Great Lakes countries.

Since 2015, several hundred thousand Burundians have fled to countries in the sub-region and beyond, and Maison Shalom opened its programs in Rwanda to support the refugees. According to UNHCR data from December 31 2021, Rwanda has a refugee population of 127,112, of which more than 80% reside in camps.

Life in exile brings many challenges that refugees face on a daily basis, including lack of livelihoods and access to basic services.



It is on this basis that the Rwandan government through MINEMA, in its 2019-2024 refugee integration strategy, announced its 4 commitments on the inclusion of refugees which are:

- 1.Ensure self-reliance of refugees;
- 2.Provide refugees with identification to facilitate access to various services, including employment;
- 3.Integrate refugees into the national education system;
- 4.Ensure urban refugees have the opportunity to buy into the National Health Insurance System

Since 2015, Maison Shalom has been contributing to the achievement of commitments 1 and 3.

It is also in the logic of Maison Shalom's intervention to support refugees and the neediest Rwandans for them to become self-reliant and live with dignity.

Maison Shalom prepares young refugees to return to their country of origin as citizens with the will and the skills to rebuild their homeland.

Maison Shalom's sectors of intervention are essentially: education (pre-school, secondary, vocational, university), economic support (providing entrepreneurship trainings and grants or microcredits), and psychosocial support (counselling and providing psychological and social support to refugees who show signs of trauma).



EDUCATION

CONTEXT

Rwanda hosts 127,112 refugees according to UNHCR statistics as of 31/12/2021. More than 89% Of the refugees reside in camps and others in urban areas in different districts.

The precariousness of the living conditions of the majority of the refugees and certain categories of the host community does not allow them to ensure the education of their children.

To face this situation, Maison Shalom supports the neediest families in the refugee and host communities through pre-school and primary education (3-11 years old), secondary education (12-18 years old), vocational training (out-of-school youth aged 18-30) and university education.



1. PRE-SCHOOL AND PRIMARY EDUCATION

In the refugee camps, pre-school education is provided by the government and the High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR). Maison Shalom provides support to the neediest urban and Rwandan refugee children.

This support consists of paying for school materials and fees, school meals, and transportation for the children who are being educated at the Oasis of Peace community center at Maison Shalom.

A. ACHIEVEMENTS

During the 2021 school year, 259 children were supported in the nursery and primary sections: 194 children in the nursery section (106 girls and 88 boys) and 65 children (46 girls and 19 boys) in the primary section.



B. IMPACT



- Improvement of health as a result of school catering.
- Increased level of physical, moral and intellectual growth and development.

2. SECONDARY EDUCATION



The beneficiaries of secondary education are young refugees from Mahama camp and the surrounding community who have obtained a score of more than 75% in the national final exam. This support provides them with an opportunity to study in the combinations of their preference (especially technical and scientific) and in adequate conditions, without being disturbed by the socio-economic challenges of their families.

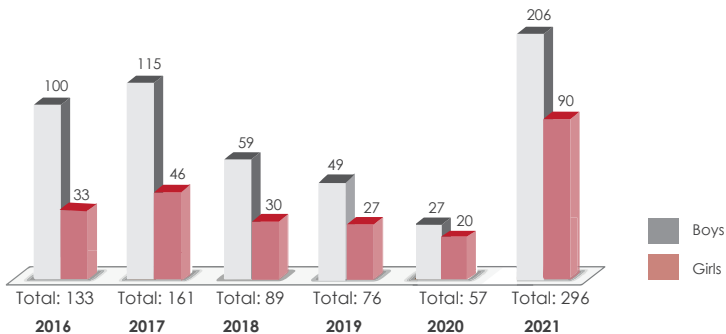
A. ACHIEVEMENTS

During the 2020-2021 school year, 296 high school students were supported by Maison Shalom. They were enrolled in 28 boarding schools identified on basis of the quality of education and available options (in relation to the students' choice).

The financial support generally consists of the cost of the school kit, transportation and health care.

Maison Shalom helped students in senior classes (3rd and 6th grades) to prepare well for the national exams through various exercises and exams from the previous years uploaded on Maison Shalom's online learning platform (www.ubuntulearning.com).

B. RESULTS AND IMPACT

All the students supported by Maison Shalom successfully completed the year and of the 9 students who took the national exam, **3 of them passed the National exam with 100%**, while 6 scored between 60%-75%.

3. VOCATIONAL TRAINING



The neediest refugee and Rwandan youth who do not attend school are enrolled in vocational training centers for their empowerment and competitiveness in the job market. Some receive their training in Maison Shalom centers and others in external centers depending on the availability of courses.

A. ACHIEVEMENTS

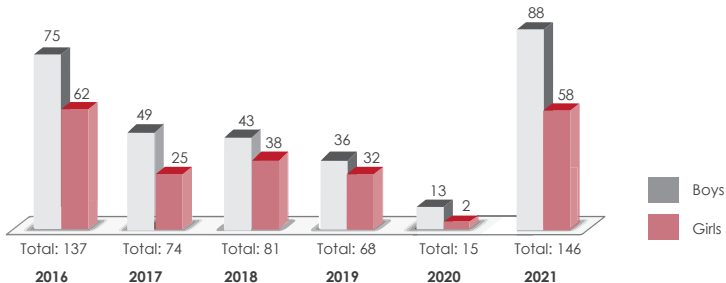
During the year 2021, Maison Shalom supported 146 young people, including 121 refugees and 25 Rwandans in vocational training.

The support consists of training fees and materials as well as a start-up kit offered at the end of the training to enable them to initiate an income-generating activity related to their training.

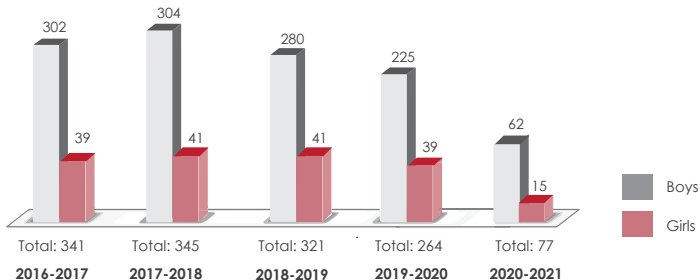
4. UNIVERSITY EDUCATION

In Rwanda, as in other African countries, access to post-secondary education remains a great challenge for the refugee youth. Maison Shalom provides an opportunity for the brightest among them to pursue a university education.

A. ACHIEVEMENTS

For 2021, **77 students** including **15 women and 62 men** in 9 universities in Rwanda and France have received a scholarship.

B. NUMBER OF STUDENTS SUPPORTED PER ACADEMIC YEAR



The **56** students who graduated in 2021 are in several fields, including: Rural Development, Economics, Civil Engineering, Law, Computer Science and Land management.

D. THE CHALLENGES OF THE EDUCATION PROGRAM

- Parents find it difficult to follow their children's education.
- The associative spirit (working in groups) is not yet developed among our laureates.
- Insufficient means to respond to all requests.



5. ONLINE LEARNING CENTERS



To provide refugees with access to internet connection and digital resources, Maison Shalom has set up two e-learning centers, one in Kigali and another in Mahama refugee camp.

During the year 2021, 1,684 refugees were trained in basic computer skills, 17 in computer programming (coding) while 23 are attending academic programs at various international universities from Mahama Refugee Camp.

6. GIRLS EDUCATION FOR A BETTER FUTURE

In Rwanda and in rural areas in particular, many girls and adolescents drop out of school because it does not offer conditions that are favorable to their specific needs.

Many schools do not have safe spaces or separate toilets for girls and boys. Some parents make teenage girls work in the home instead of sending them to school like boys. Also, some teachers are unaware of, or insensitive to the specific needs of girls, which often hinders good learning.

It is in this context that Maison Shalom carries out specific activities dedicated to the promotion of girls education, including the rehabilitation of schools, the creation and equipping of safe spaces for girls, and building capacity of teaching staff in inclusion and gender sensitive pedagogy.

ACADÉMIE UBUNTU



Initiated by members of the Burundian diaspora and friends of Maison Shalom, “Académie Ubuntu” aims to develop popular educational programs that aim to transmit knowledge on diverse subjects, such as leadership, resilience, environment protection, economics, public health, analysis of social issues, etc..

The Académie Ubuntu aims to be a space open to all, regardless of their status and level of study. The absence of a formal education or training can in no way be an obstacle to participating in the workshops and learning the modules.

These modules allow everyone to have access to this knowledge, and to share the experiences that emerge in order to ensure knowledge appropriation and the application of critical thinking for personal and collective emancipation.

During the year 2021, **148** young refugees have taken the Académie Ubuntu modules: 57 in leadership, 23 in health and environment, 28 in human rights and 17 in audiovisual.



ECONOMIC SUPPORT

A. CONTEXT

Refugees living in Rwanda and social categories of low income in the host community, face enormous challenges exacerbated by the effects of Covid 19 Pandemic. Generated economic worsened the poverty and the lives of many households have been disproportionately affected due to high drop in income. Many people lost their jobs because there was a lay-off of staff for some enterprises and other businesses have completely closed.

Since 2016, "The Economic Empowerment Programs", has supported families in need to start income generating activities with a training in management of small business coupled with provision of micro-grants and equipment. The participants in the program are ultimately chosen from households of vulnerable children supported in the Education Program or people receiving support in the Psychosocial Program.

The program interventions aim to provide the participants with pathways for advancement and to build their confidence to stand for their dignity.

The Economic Support Program is being implemented in four following areas: MAHAMA Sector of KIREHE District in the Eastern Province, specifically in the refugee camp; KIGALI City; HUYE District of Southern Province and the District of BUGESERA (Eastern Province).



B. ACHIEVEMENTS

B. 1. CAPACITY BUILDING

Capacity building in management of small businesses was provided to 395 participants among which 89.11% were refugees and 10.89% Rwandans, composed of 47.57% females and 54.43%.

B. 2. FUNDING OF INCOME GENERATING ACTIVITIES

Beneficiaries are exclusively refugees enrolled in Rwanda and members of the host community with low income and living in the intervention zones. On the total of 253 applications composed of 228 micro grant applications and 25 equipment applications, 186 applications were funded. Applicants were composed of 37 working in groups and 149 working individually.

In the urban areas applicants are interested in commercial businesses while in the rural areas they focus on agribusiness and rearing. The income generating activities reach 692 households composed of 319 males and 373 females among whom 352 are refugees and 340 Rwandans. Out of 692 participants, 70% are located in KIREHE District and live in MAHAMA Refugees Camp.

The total amount invested in funding income generating activities is one hundred and twenty-four million, eight hundred and twenty-nine thousand, five hundred and ninety-six Rwandan francs (124,829,596) divided in Fifty-two million, seven hundred thirteen thousand, two hundred and sixty-two (52,713,262) invested in micro-grants and seventy-two million, one hundred and sixteen thousand, three hundred and thirty-four Rwandan francs (72,116,334) invested in equipment for income generating activities.

D. CHALLENGES

Lack of innovations/ new business ideas: Instead of creating new business ideas, many participants want to repeat the same activities implemented in the same area.

The precarious living conditions of refugees: The micro-grant sometimes is used to sort out households needs instead of a business capital .

Repeated interruption of activities that resulted from the COVID-19 measures makes the follow up difficult.

PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT



A. CONTEXT

The psychosocial program of Maison Shalom in Rwanda provides assistance to refugees and members of the host community in need, to overcome the various traumas and challenges associated with their history. Indeed, some people suffer from having lost everything, others were persecuted, tortured or witnessed atrocities committed in front their eyes.

In 2021, there was a particular of the beneficiaries' number due to sensitization conducted to speak out the traumatic experiences for healing, especially for the category of refugees who had chosen to live in discretion after exile.

In this year, people composed of 421 Burundians , 306 Rwandans and 12 Congolese were provided with counseling services.

1. ACHIEVEMENTS

1.1. COUNSELING SERVICES

In 2021, 87 participants with a range of psychosocial problems (post-traumatic health disorder, physical injuries, flashbacks, nightmares, sleeplessness, major depression, panic disorders, anxiety and difficulties in everyday functioning, etc.) were able to access the available individual and group counselling interventions. Overall, participants who recognized using more counseling services showed a more rapid decrease in trauma symptoms, boosted self-confidence and remarkable reintegration.

- PSYCHOTHERAPY AND ORIENTATION

The psychotherapy consists of using scientifically validated procedures to help a victim to confront his painful memories through storytelling; understand his negative feelings and learn how to turn those feelings into a productive outlook. The consultation also allows to orient the victim to other service providers either in Maison Shalom or outside.

- PSYCHOEDUCATION

In every therapy session, the psychotherapy team engage discussion that help the client to be aware of basic values or human rights to reinforce his ability to cope with every day functioning.

1.2. SOCIAL SUPPORT

- 351 people sponsored for medical services.
- **136** refugees in urban area supported with food provision.
- 76 people mostly in need were provided with various items (books, uniforms, clothes, school bags etc.)
- 89 refugees assisted to access medical services.

2. POSITIVE IMPACT

Testimonies from beneficiaries show that refugees showing signs of post-traumatic stress are now living a normal life. Their emotional life has significantly improved.

3. Challenges

- Full recovery of traumatized beneficiaries: For some, it takes much longer to recover than others.
- Sometimes the inaccessibility to basic needs (food, accommodation, school needs) leads to relapses.
- Cultural barriers: To consult a psychologist or a psychiatrist can appear to some as a sign of weakness or even a cause of stigmatization.
- Limited availability of means compared to the extent of the demand for trauma healing.

We rely on the complementarity of the various programs (Education, Economic Support) to find the solutions adapted to each identified case.

During 2021, the psychotherapy work to heal a broad variety of emotional difficulties of refugees was successful. Many wounded people have been reconciled with their own stories. The intervention has boosted the confidence of desperate refugees and restored their hope to make new plans for life.

OASIS OF PEACE COMMUNITY CENTRE IN KIGALI

The Oasis of Peace Community Center is a place established to provide a range of intellectual, cultural and social development services for urban refugees and Rwandans. Recently, it has become the property of Maison Shalom, and was improved to adapt it to the needs of the users. The Centre has a nursery school, space for vocational training and a space open to public events.





AT THE MAHAMA REFUGEE CAMP

CONTEXT

Maison Shalom opened its field office in the refugee camp to be able to respond rapidly and effectively to the needs of refugees. The field office has a space for vocational training and socio-cultural training «Mahama Elite Centre» (MEC). It offers free access to internet and a library open to all refugees in the camp.

In addition to vocational training (sewing and leather work) and computer training, courses are offered online. The MEC offers a range of training for capacity building and intellectual upgrading of refugees to enable them to be more competitive on the market.





HOZAGARA HUB

Maison Shalom has set up a modern restaurant and an accommodation providing basic quality services in the area.

This center is a place for learning and practicing certain trades (culinary art, table services, etc.) and creating employment for young people trained in those trades (Out of 16 employees, 10 are graduates who have been supported by Maison Shalom for various training courses). The center has 7 guest rooms, a conference room, a restaurant as well as a sales area of baked and pastry products made on site.

AGATEKA KACU FUND BY AND FOR REFUGEES

Considering that the majority of the populations of Rwanda and the refugees countries of origin live on agriculture, Maison Shalom has been educating and supporting young and adult refugees with breeding initiatives since 2018.

From June 2021, following an alarming situation of suspension of food rations for certain categories of refugees in the camps, the initiative was launched to create employment for refugees in order to work and earn their own living.

More than 40 000 refugees and Rwandans from low-income families have been employed. By working they earn more than four times as much as by waiting for the rations offered and understand that they are still able to work and earn a living, even in exile.

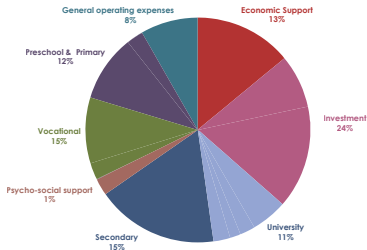
